Great Western Park - traffic through West Hagbourne

Concern grows over the impact of increases in through traffic caused by the building of Great Western Park and the possibility of even more plans to expand Didcot further.

Parish Councillors have met with representatives of UKAEA Harwell to see if a joint approach would be possible to help alleviate future traffic problems anticipated by the growth of Didcot.

UKAEA Harwell want to ensure the local roads are adequate for the movement of traffic to and from the business park, and are suggesting, amongst other things, that a Harwell bypass should be built. The Council is hoping the two organisations can work together to build a strong case for local road improvements, including a bypass, but also that such a road and other road improvements will benefit West Hagbourne and not

merely benefit Harwell village and UKAEA

Hagbourne and Didcot met with Cathy Scotting from SODC's Planning Department on Thursday 25th May to discuss issues surrounding the impact of the Didcot West development on the villages and Didcot. We will keep you informed of future developments but in the meantime the Parish Council is concentrating on working with neighbouring parishes to wards gaining a commitment to relieving the problem of more through traffic that will certainly be generated by Didcot West on top of current through traffic volumes that the Parish Council has evidence that volumes increase year on

Councillors are currently conducting a year-long traffic survey that will provide us with

an up to date representative sample of peak flow traffic through West Hagbourne. Councillors from East and West Thanks to Hugh Lewis who is recording traffic flows through the village.

Enforcement of weight restrictions

OCC's Trading Standards Dept has undertaken a recent exercise to enforce weight restrictions through Watlington that resulted in a number of fixed penalties being issued and further cases still under investigation.

parish council report

The Parish Council met on *Thursday* **11th May** at Hagbourne School.
There were <u>no</u> members of the public present.

Planning applications The Parish Council had no strong views on the planning application for the erection of a two-storey side extension and internal alterations at Orchard House saying it . The Council has not yet been informed about the outcome.

Experimental traffic proposals The Parish Council will meet with the County Council's Area Traffic Engineer in the village and decide with him which of the white lines and road signs are to be removed. These will be replaced if the experiment proves not to be a success.

Village Spring Clean This was successful and the Parish Council thanks all those who helped.

Clearance of School Path There were insufficient people to expose the Foxglove Lane end of School Path which is lost under the mud. Chris Lay has since tried clearing the path by machine but his plant is too large, so manual labour does appear to be the only answer. The Parish Council thanks Chris Lay for trying and now

hopes that other volunteers can tackle it as part of the "village appearance" suggestions for the Parish Plan.

Grass cutting contract Isis Accord, who have cut the grass in recent years, advised the Parish Council in March that their price would be increased this year by 100%. Following discussion with Isis Accord they offered to cut the grass in April at last year's price to give the Parish Council time to review the situation.

Following a review by the Chairman and the Clerk of the areas being cut and the frequency of cuts for each area, which resulted in some small areas previously cut being omitted and the frequency of cuts for some areas on the edges of the village being reduced, new competitive quotations were obtained and the contract this year has now been awarded to Scion Estates. The cost per cut will be slightly less than was paid last year.

The Parish Council regrets that some parts may not look as tidy this year as usual but, in the circumstances, considers this better value for money considering the limited budget available to it. The areas and frequency will be reviewed again next year.

Parish Plan The emphasis has recently been on progressing some of the suggestions made by the village for the Parish Plan, for example

The Garage Sale held in May.

Welcome pack - Work on this is progressing.

Youth events - Promised but not yet forthcoming. Bowling has been suggested.

Village appearance - A meeting of interested people has been held and a programme of improvements agreed. French Conversation Group - This meets regularly. A work exchange arrangement has been suggested (e.g. Ironing in exchange for gardening)

Traffic Group - A meeting will be arranged soon to decide on what action is needed to help address the village traffic problems.

Land adjacent to the Horse and Harrow The ground has still not been cleared by the contractor. The Parish Council will continue to chase.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be on *Thursday 13th July* at 7.30 in Hagbourne School.

parish meeting

21 people attended a lively Annual Parish Meeting that was held at Broomsticks on Saturday 20th May 2006.

Copies of the Annual reports of the Parish Council, William Tyrrell Trust, Village History Group, Parish Plan Steering Group and Patrick Greene's County Council and District Council reports were available at the meeting.

Sue Totterdell thanked everyone who had participated in the parish plan.

Marion Judd gave a resume of the history and function of the William Tyrrell Trust and its ability to make small grants. She said the Trust intended making a small grant to Julia Tiller and the triplets following the death of her husband, Steve Gore. Marion also mentioned the formal requirement for a tenancy agreement for the allotments site.

A summary of the County Council and District Council reports was given by Cllr Patrick Greene.

Peter Mitchell gave a verbal report of the activities of the Village Association during the past year.

And during the Open Forum many issues were discussed including:

Land opposite the Horse and Harrow where a contractor had been appointed but had failed to do the work, Andrea Mitchell asked what the land would be used for.

Didcot West: Phil Taylor asked Patrick Greene whether recent Council proposals meant the gap between Didcot and West Hagbourne is to be lost. Patrick Greene was unaware of any such proposals. Marion Judd asked for a dedicated gap to be maintained between the village and Didcot.

Phil Taylor mentioned the concerns about additional traffic through the village as a

result of Didcot West. He said that suggestions for a Harwell bypass would not help West Hagbourne and drew attention to the alternatives for a West Hagbourne bypass that were displayed at the meeting. The general consensus was in favour of option shown in this newsletter.

Mary Wiley asked whether the future water shortage was being taken into account. Patrick Greene said he had been participating in a water review which included a suggestion that provision is made for "grey" water to be recycled.

Skips for garden waste: the Parish Council had allowed for providing skips in the budget but wanted to see how successful the brown wheelie bins would be. The majority of those present seemed to want a skip to be provided for autumn waste too large for a wheelie bin and would like it in October.

Experimental removal of white lines, etc.: Peter Mitchell asked when this was going to happen. Phil Taylor said that the next step would be to meet the traffic engineer and agree with him where lines and/or signs would be removed. The white lines outside Green Thatch would remain.

Closure of Hagbourne Hill: The road is due to be closed in June for significant road repairs. the effect of this would be interesting on how traffic uses the village, especially when the Chilton side is closed. Hugh Lewis is constantly videoing traffic through the village in order that the Parish Council can evaluate the impact this makes.

Skill swap scheme: Sue Totterdell said that as suggested in the Parish Plan a proposal for a work swap scheme is shortly to be launched whereby people with specific skills could do jobs for others in exchange for them doing a job in return.
