## **Citizens Advice**

......

I took my car into a local garage for some minor repairs and when I went to collect it they wanted to charge me much more than was originally agreed. They won't let me take my car away until I pay the full amount. What can I do?

If you asked the garage to do whatever needed to be done to fix the fault, you'll probably have to pay the full amount as long as the work was necessary and the price is reasonable.

However, if the garage has carried out work that you didn't ask for, you can either insist you only pay for what was agreed or you can refuse to pay for the additional work and dispute the bill. You'll have to tell the garage why you think the bill is too high and what you're prepared to pay.

While you're disputing the bill, the garage has the right to keep your vehicle until the bill has been paid. If you need your car urgently, you should only pay under protest. State this clearly in writing on the repair order sheet, say why you think the bill is too high, and make it clear that you intend to take the claim to the county court

If you can't afford to pay the bill under protest, or the costs of going to court would be more than the amount of money you're disputing, talk to the garage to try and come

to an agreement about what vou should pav.

The garage can't sell or get rid of your car while you're disputing the bill, so they may be prepared to negotiate with you to get the vehicle off their hands.

But don't take your car away before you've paid the bill, or you could be prosecuted for theft.

Carrving out work that you didn't ask for or which is unnecessary could be breaking the law. If you suspect the garage has done this, report them to Consumer not alone. Currently over 5 Direct who can advise you (08454 04 05 06 or www.consumerdirect.gov.uk

## Energy Advice

Does the thought of your next heating bill leave you cold? With the recent

announcements from the main energy providers of large increases in the price of energy, the cost of keep warm is rising. It is becoming harder for residents to keep their homes heated to the

recommended temperatures of  $21^{\circ}C(70^{\circ}F)$  in the living room and 18°C (65°F) in other occupied rooms. To help combat this, a free phone helpline has been set up to advise residents in Oxfordshire how to cut their energy bills.

The service is offered by the United Sustainable Energy Agency in partnership with Oxfordshire County Council, the five Oxfordshire District Councils and Oxfordshire Primary Care Trust.

If you are finding your energy bills unmanageable, you are million people in the UK cannot afford to pay for the heat they need. Any resident in Oxfordshire who is struggling with their energy bills can call 0800 107 00 44 for free, impartial advice on:
