Brook Lane flood

Wednesday June 12th was not a wet day but as we drove back into the village from Didcot in the early afternoon we noticed the water pouring down Brook Lane and flooding the road. By the time we got to the bridge over the culvert, the water was higher than we had ever seen and cars were passing only with difficulty. Water was coming off the field at the Coscote junction faster than it could flow away in the stream, so the level was building rapidly. Those cars which did make it through produced quite a wave, which threatened to bring the

water even closer to the village. The driver of an MG sports car wisely decided to find another route and a cyclist diverted to take the railway cycle track. Shortly after we had passed through, police closed the road. Hurrying home, we called Thames Water who luckily were already aware of a mains leak and had a repair crew on its way.

Once they had stopped the water leak, the level in the road soon fell but not before home-coming Harwell traffic had had to find an alternative route. By early evening the road was reopened with nothing but a residue of gravel and dirt to show where the flood had been.

Bike Night 2013

After a wet event in 2012, the 2013 John Wheeler British Bike Night, jointly organised by the North Berks Motor Cycle Club and the AJS and Matchless Owners' Club, was held at The Horse and Harrow on Tuesday 16 July - well into the heat wave period.

In addition to a record entry for the 'best bike of the show' competition there was also a record attendance, estimated to be in excess of 5,000.

As well as British bikes, there were plenty of foreign ones, including a fine BMW combination, as well as a Russian Ural, and there were also trade stands and a small show of



British cars, mainly from the 1960s and 1970s.

A collection of customised bikes also attracted plenty of attention.

Nate and Alicia, the grandchildren of Fred

Robinson of Manor Close, were the youngest members of the team performing trials demonstrations in the arena at the edge of the field and showed amazing skills when negotiating various obstacles at speed. The skills of teenage riders riding over parked old cars also contributed immensely to the continuing success of this annual event the proceeds of which go towards providing a Christmas lunch for village pensioners at The Horse and Harrow.

Garden update

This summer has seen more changes to the gardens on either side of the bus shelter. The wild flowers planted last year provided a good splash of colour but sadly not much variety. It may be too shady between the bus shelter and the phone box. At the end of July the project for the border below the noticeboard was finally completed with the planting of a range of hardy perennials which should attract pollinating insects. The soil was first improved and the water-retention increased by digging in a thick layer of compost. The planting is quite dense so that the effects should be seen by next year.

A start has also been made on tidying the gardens on the left of the bus shelter. Although originally planted with an interesting range of shrubs, this area had become seriously overgrown and the shrubs were misshapen due to the competition between each other and the effects of the underplanting with periwinkle. We have decided to try to eliminate the periwinkle before replanting this area with a less invasive ground cover. We will also be removing some of the existing shrubs but replanting in the same spirit as the original plan, to provide year-round interest. In the next couple of weeks we hope to move the salt box from its rather intrusive location along the edge of this garden and place it on some paving, between the bus shelter and the phone box, to the side of the water butt. It should be equally as accessible there but should no longer spoil the view of the gardens.

News

Fly Tipping

Becky Lake, the communications officer at the Oxfordshire Waste Partnership, wants to alert you to some of their forthcoming campaigns. Over the summer they will be at local recycling sites highlighting the problem of fly tipping, providing information about what happens to your recycled rubbish as well as promoting the National Love Food Hate Waste campaign giving away free recipe books for using left over food and providing information about how to reduce food waste. Our local fly tipping hot spot is at the first Coscote bend at the northern end of Brook Lane. If you see waste there, please let the Parish Clerk know as she can arrange for it to be taken away.

Broadband

Oxfordshire County Council recently announced that they are confident that their programme of Broadband investment will deliver superfast broadband (24Mbps) to at least 90% of premises (homes and businesses) in the county. This £13.86 million investment translates into 65,000+ premises across the county getting superfast speeds that would otherwise not have done so. Negotiations are ongoing and they expect to start delivering the programme over a twoyear period beginning January 2014. In the meantime, OCC is advising local groups to hold back on community ventures. Coverage maps should be available from the beginning of August.

Given West Hagbourne's experience with BT in terms of failed promises, it will be interesting to keep an eye on how this county-wide plan works for us. Be prepared to lobby your County Councillor, Patrick Greene, to ensure that we are not short-changed again.



Hedgehogs

A group of ecologists based at Reading University is interested in examining the impact of major roads on hedgehog populations. It is estimated that hedgehog populations in some parts of the UK have declined by approximately 20% in the last 20 years, and one possible factor contributing to this decline is the fragmentation effect of major roads on hedgehog populations i.e. hedgehogs avoid crossing these major roads, leading to populations becoming more and more isolated from one another, which potentially makes them more vulnerable to other factors.

For their study, the scientists want to obtain genetic samples from hedgehogs in a zone approximately 10 miles north and south of the M4 between Bristol and Reading. They want to enlist the help of people living in this study zone by getting them to report any dead hedgehogs they see so that the remains can be collected and small tissue samples taken for analysis. History Group

It will come as no surprise that the History Group has decided to finally call it a day. Following many futile appeals for new blood and the loss of several members of the original team, we feel the time is right to make an exit.

The West Hagbourne Village History Group was established in 1991. The Group published Windsor Hakeborne: the Story of West Hagbourne to coincide with the millennium year 2000. The publication followed nine years of research and received very appreciative reviews. Following the launch of Windsor Hakeborne the Group embarked on several projects, including:

The commissioning of a new memorial plaque bearing the names of all the men from West Hagbourne who gave their lives in two world wars. A dedication ceremony took place on 30th June 2002 at the village war memorial (bus shelter).

A major restoration of the unique armorial font in the south aisle of St Andrew's Church, including repainting the medieval shields of West Hagbourne manorial families in their original colours.

Two archaeological surveys with the Berkshire Archaeology Research Group in 2004 and 2007 to confirm the site of West Hagbourne's medieval chapel in the paddock at Chapel Hayes.

A new millennium project in 2001 to capture an accurate picture of West Hagbourne at the very beginning of the 21st century. This involved a questionnaire to all households and the photographing of every house and building in the village.

A very successful village archive day to display the Group's collection of historic memorabilia at York Farm on 25th September 2011. This was a joint effort with the Village Association which provided refreshments.

The History Group maintains an archive of photographs, maps, documents, census returns, sale notices and personal memoirs. We have created photo albums, folders and scrap books illustrating village events including the Jubilees, the millennium celebrations and much more. All this material is currently being catalogued and prepared for transfer to an appropriate depository.

It is hoped that one day in the future another history group may be formed to continue where we have left off.

Neglected again
