# Didcot expands

In the past couple of weeks, the Vale of the White Horse District Council has published its Local Plan to 2031. Of interest to residents of West Hagbourne will be the continued growth of Didcot within the Vale's boundary. A new area of housing (Valley Park), a site for over a thousand more homes, is shown to the west of the Great Western Park site, stretching all the way to the A34 from the Milton Link Road in the north to the A417 in the south.

In addition, sites in Chilton and Harwell parishes adjacent to the current Harwell Business site will provide yet more housing and employment locally. Shown on the map is the first part of a proposed link road from the Wantage Road in Didcot down to the A417 near the Kingswell Hotel.

This could alleviate traffic through West Hagbourne but only if the route is



extended from the Kingswell to the entrance to the Harwell site. Sadly this second phase of the road, proposed almost 10 years ago by the then parish councillors, is alluded to but not included in the plan.

Responses must be made before April 4th so you will need to be quick.

An additional parcel of housing has been proposed to fit in beside the proposals for expanding the access onto the A<sub>34</sub> north and south at Chilton. This would certainly impact on West Hagbourne, as the nearest place for shopping would be in Didcot and the logical route is straight through the village.

### **Floods**

At the time of writing it does seem as though the worst of the wet winter weather is over. Streams and ditches are starting to dry up and the huge puddles of water visible in many fields are gradually shrinking. We are told that such extreme weather may become the norm in the future. It is probably time for all residents to think about what they can do to reduce the risk of flooding due to run off. For example, you can reduce the impervious surfaces around the house, and use gravel trenches to catch some of the run-off.

Collecting the rain water that comes from your roof will not only slow down the rate at which the water runs into soakaways and drains but will also provide you with water for the garden later in the year. Interestingly, bare soil also contributes to faster runoff so a few plants can help enormously. Even better if you plant some that will thrive in wet conditions. Trees are great at taking up water and reducing levels in the ground, too.

Maintenance of ditches and water courses will also help and this is the responsibility of the land owner.



In line with an initiative by the Royal Horticultural Society, we shall be scattering annual poppy seeds on the garden beside the shelter and will concentrate on red flowers and foliage in the adjacent pots. The plan for the half-barrels under the horse chestnut tree has yet to be decided.

# **Employment**

No one knows when an accident or illhealth could have a dramatic impact on their life. Last year the Government added an extra step to the process for applying for sickness and disability support. The Work Capability Assessment (WCA) process, will now include an extra step before sick and disabled people can access financial support through Employment Support Allowance (ESA).

If your sickness or disability prevents you from working, then you could be entitled to ESA to help you manage your day to day living costs. Since October last year, the Government introduced a new 'mandatory reconsideration' phase to ESA. This extra step happens after you receive a decision on your initial application for support and you can't lodge an appeal until it is completed. It is supposed to take about two weeks to go through the reconsideration period but unfortunately some of our clients report it can take much longer.

You won't be able to claim ESA during the reconsideration phase but you can apply for Jobseekers Allowance so some people might be left with no financial support. If you're in this situation then you should go to your local Citizens Advice Bureau in Didcot for help on how to manage your finances and make sure your application is dealt with fairly and promptly. Once the reconsideration process has taken place, you may well get a positive decision about your application. If you are unhappy with the decision, you can appeal.

# CAB - Debt

Debt can be daunting but taking a proactive approach to sort them out is a good way forward. One of the first things you need to do is figure out who you owe money to and how much. It is easy for debts to get out of hand, particularly as interest and other charges may be added to the amount you owe.

It's really important to prioritise your debts. Urgent debts are things like rent, energy bills and council tax. If you don't pay these, you could face being evicted, have your gas and electricity cut off or taken to court because you didn't pay your council tax. It's worth remembering that those who shout the loudest aren't necessarily those who should be paid first. Less urgent debts are things like water bills and credit cards.

The next step is to work out a budget by listing all of the money you have coming in and going out each month. That way you'll be able to see what you have left over and how much you can pay towards your debts. After that, it is time to speak to the companies you owe money, agree a new repayment plan, remembering to stick to your list of urgent and non-urgent debts. Only agree to repayment plans you can afford. You can get free, independent and impartial advice from your local CAB.

To celebrate the millennium and thank the village for its support, a copy of the publication was given to every household in the village.

# **Broadband**

As you may have read in the press, the government has released more money to ensure that rural areas do no lose out on access to superfast broadband. On their website, Oxfordshire county council state that their aim is to bring at least 24 Mbps to 90% of households in the county.

So it is interesting that West Hagbourne may be destined to suffer a second-rate service. Part of the problem is that we are deemed by BT to already have access to high-speed fibre broadband since fibre optic cables were laid to Upton. However, as residents will be aware, speeds in the village are some way short of the target of 24 Mbps. Recent correspondence with our MP Ed Vaizey confirms that we are likely to fall through this gap. He says "given that you already have good broadband speeds (albeit not superfast), it may be difficult to get an upgrade under the scheme." This is particularly disappointing given that his ministerial responsibilities include Communications. Continued lobbying at every opportunity is recommended.

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
