Phone Box

The sharp-eyed among you may have noticed that, while the phone box awaits a final decision about its new use housing a defibrillator, it is being used as a book (and other small items) exchange. If you have any books you would like to put there, please take them along.

At the same time, help yourself to any titles that interest you. From time to time, if the number of books gets too large, some may be taken to a charity shop in Didcot.

If you are leaving books, please make sure that they are either on the shelves or in the plastic container as it can get quite damp inside the phone box and this has already led to some books having to be thrown away when they became too sodden.

Community Public Access Defibrillator CPAD

Donations continue to arrive for this project, showing that it really has struck a chord with many residents.

So far **one third** of the target required has been contributed from businesses and individuals in the village.

With further support promised from BT, British Coatings, West Hagbourne Parish Council & Village Association plus an additional grant from The Community Heartbeat Trust we should reach the target of £2,300 by the end of January 2015.

This would mean the defibrillator could be installed during February.

A few things remain to be resolved before we can order the equipment.

These include confirming the use of the telephone box, agreeing which defibrillator to buy, arranging events for volunteers, as well as putting in

place a formalised plan for the ongoing monitoring and maintenance of the unit once it's in place.

We need to ensure compliance with some statutory governance and to liaise with the local Ambulance Trust to ensure that all the defibrillators located in the community are compatible with the ones they use.

A full Awareness Training Session will be held to coincide with installation, where the use of the defibrillator will be fully explained to the community.

These units are only **accessed via the 999 operator** and once switched on are self-explanatory as they guide the user with step-by-step voice instructions.

Come along at 7.30pm on Wednesday 21st January to Hagbourne Village Hall and find out more about the project.



Costs associated with the unit

- The secure case + PAD £ 2,100
- Installation + Electrics £ 200
- BT will supply electricity for 7 years
- BCF will provide paint treatments

Ongoing costs will amount to **no** more than £75 per annum, less if the unit is not activated to save a life.

It is hoped that the Parish Council will contribute to the capital cost and take full responsibility for the on-going costs, allowing this piece of life-saving equipment to become part of West Hagbourne's community resource.

Vale consultation

If you want to have your say about the latest Local Plan for the Vale of the White Horse, which includes the parishes of Harwell, Chilton, Blewbury and Upton which all border West Hagbourne you need to get going. The consultation on the new Local Plan 2031 closes on December 19th. This document sets out the vision for future development in this area for the next 16 years and, inevitably, includes a lot of housing and business development. Target sites that will impact on West Hagbourne are possibly 3350 more homes in Great Western Park, up to 1400 homes on Harwell campus. At the latter site there is also planned economic development.



In particular, they recall the time, a couple of years ago, when on St George's Day he led the Judges in the Dragon competition around the village on his own 'dragon' - a specially customised mobility scooter which eventually won the competition.



Free Parking

People in South Oxfordshire will be able to take advantage of the traditional free parking days again this Christmas.

Drivers will be able to park for FREE in **South Oxfordshire District Council** car parks as follows:

Didcot – from midday onwards on Tuesdays 3, 10, 17 and 24 December

Henley – all day on Saturdays 7, 14, and 21 December

Wallingford – from midday onwards on Thursdays 5, 12 and 19 December.

The annual free parking is provided by the district council in December to encourage people to shop locally for their Christmas presents.

Winter advice

Look in on vulnerable neighbours friends, relatives and neighbours who may be more suffering as a result of cold weather. The winter season is especially dangerous for older people or people with serious illnesses, so check in on them if you can.

Follow these tips to keep you, your family and those around you warm and well in extremely cold weather.

- To keep warm and well during spells of cold weather:
- Draw your curtains at dusk and keep your doors closed to block out draughts.
- Have regular hot drinks and eat at least one hot meal a day if possible. Eating regularly helps keep energy levels up during winter.
- Wear several light layers of warm clothes (rather than one chunky layer).
- Keep as active in your home as possible.
- Wrap up warm and wear shoes with a good grip if you need to go outside on cold days.
- If you have reduced mobility, are 65 or over, or have a health condition such as heart or lung disease, you should heat your home to at least 18C and make sure you wear enough clothes to stay warm.
- If you're under 65 and healthy, you can safely have your house cooler than 18C, if you're comfortable.

Parish Clerk Vacancy

The current Parish Clerk has handed in her resignation and will be leaving early in the new year. The Parish Council is looking for a replacement Clerk who will also be the Responsible Financial Officer for the Council.

The post is part time and the hours required will be up to half a day a week on average (3-5 hours), working at home and also attending seven evening meetings per year. The position is a paid one and the Clerk will be an employee of the council. The current salary is £1824 per year. Tax will be paid under PAYE. Experience of working as a Parish Clerk is an advantage but is not essential, as training can be provided by the Oxfordshire Association of Local Councils and other bodies.
