Parish Meeting

The Annual Parish meeting will be held on Wednesday 20th May, at 7.30pm in Hagbourne Village Hall.

The purpose of this meeting is to enable residents of West Hagbourne to hear what the Parish Council has done on their behalf over the past year, and for residents to discuss any matters they consider to be important for the Parish. With so many new developments taking place that will impact on quality of lives in the Parish, it is hoped that as many residents as possible will be able to attend.

Defib update

We are delighted to be able to announce that the Public Access Defibrillator unit has now been installed in the newly-refurbished telephone kiosk in the middle of the village. That this has happened so quickly is down to the energy and commitment of Phil Taylor who has driven the project tirelessly, and successfully applied for a number of additional grants.

The defibrillator is now listed by South Central Ambulance Service allowing them to direct any 999 caller that might benefit from its use.

Most important, however, has been the generosity of villagers who together have contributed more than £2000 towards the total cost.

Donations from the Parish Council and Village Association, together with grants from a number of bodies mean we have achieved our target.

Overall costs for the refurbishment of the phone box have been kept to a minimum due to the hard work of a small number of volunteers, most notably, Paul Ryman and Robert Griffiths who took the kiosk to pieces and also to Dave Totterdell who cleaned all the glass panels. Thanks to all of them, and also to Malcolm Brownsword for his photographic record of this project.

In addition thanks in advance to our volunteers who will monitor the equipment and make sure that it is in working order.

ESA

No one knows when an accident or ill-health could have a dramatic impact on their life. If sickness or disability prevents you from working, then you could be entitled to Employment Support Allowance (ESA) to help you manage your day to day living costs. The Work Capability

Assessment (WCA) process, which has come under fire for lengthy and unfair decisions since it was introduced in 2008, will now include an extra step before sick and disabled people can access financial support through ESA. Since October last year, the Government introduced a new 'mandatory reconsideration' phase to ESA. This extra step in the process comes after you receive a decision on your initial application for support and you can't lodge an appeal until it is completed. It is supposed to take about two weeks to go through the reconsideration period but it may take much longer. You won't be able to claim ESA during the reconsideration phase but you can apply for Jobseekers Allowance. If you find this difficult and are left without financial support you should go to your local Citizens Advice Bureau in Didcot for help on how to manage your finances and make sure your application is dealt with fairly and promptly.

Moor Lane

Many of you will have noticed that the vegetation in Moor Lane has recently been cut back. This work was arranged by Chris and Sue Lay and should give much better access to this right of way. At the moment, the surface of the track is quite badly rutted by the machinery that was used but eventually the aim is to provide an all-weather surface, probably laid along the middle, to prevent it being destroyed by any motor vehicles using this route.

As well as facilitating access to maintain the ditch, the clearance should allow much more light to reach the water, encouraging wildlife. At the same time, removal of some of the more aggressive plant species allows a chance to encourage a more diverse habitat. It might be possible in the future to strim some areas once or twice a year to allow some grassland species to establish.

Moor Lane is a BOAT (byway open to all traffic, so it is not possible to restrict access by motor vehicles).

The kiosk

The old and rather neglected telephone box has now been made completely watertight, the wooden framed door replaced, the metalwork completely repainted in BT Currant Red, its glazing has all been resealed and new LED lighting installed.

New signage has been applied in the original style and the royal crests have been picked out. The kiosk now houses a secure 999 activated cabinet which protects the latest portable defibrillator unit that will give you step by step instructions as and when it is needed in an emergency.
