Plans in our area

There have been a number of items in this year's newsletters highlighting various major planning applications that might impact on residents in West Hagbourne, either directly or indirectly, by such things as increased traffic.

You can read elsewhere in this edition about negotiations between the Parish Council and Oxfordshire Highways about plans for traffic management in the village.

We have tried to put together a map showing where there are current, or recent, planning applications and where works are being carried out. We have included the application for development of the site beside the Horse and Harrow which, although withdrawn in its current form, is likely to be resubmitted.

Many villagers will sympathise with the active campaign based in East Hagbourne, aimed at preventing the building of houses in fields that separate the village from Didcot (see mindthegreengap.org)



Thefts

Thames Valley Police is appealing for witnesses following three burglaries (non-dwelling) in West Hagbourne. Between 8.30am and 6pm on Tuesday (10/11)a KTM Ultrafun mountain bike in orange and turquoise was stolen from an insecure shed in Foxglove Lane. Between 17th/18th November power tools were stolen from a van in York Road. Between 26th/27th two more vans were burgled in Main Street. There have also been thefts in Upton during November.

Reducing floods

You may have noticed a large tanker lorry in the village recently that seemed to be making a lot of noise. It was here to clean out the drains in the road to ensure a better flow for run off water. This visit was welcome in several parts of the village where standing water was becoming a problem after heavy rain. Certainly the workmen found a completely blocked pipe under York Road. We will watch with interest in the event of future heavy rain.

In addition to the problems of increasingly heavy rain, West Hagbourne was once again threatened with a deluge as a result of a broken mains water pipe in the field at Coscote. The water cascaded off the field and left mud all over the road which was quickly removed by a cleaning lorry, once the water escape had been dealt with.

Work on regenerating the village pond is more or less complete. Removing the tons of silt and mud was a massive task but almost immediately the pond began to fill. In the spring there are plans to plant the sloping margins which will help to stabilise them and prevent the soil being washed back into the basin. The plants will also provide cover for smaller aquatic animals using the sloping sides to access the water. It is possible that the dragon will have to grow some longer legs for next year's competition.

Citizens Advice

Heat your home and save money.

Are you having problems heating your house, or do you feel that you're paying more than you should? South Oxfordshire Citizens Advice is urging people to take action, cut their bills by checking that they are on the best possible deal, switch tariff or supplier, or take up offers of help to insulate their homes.

You could benefit from savings of up to £320 a year from energy efficiency measures, an average of £100 by paying by direct debit, and up to £200 by shopping around.

Citizens Advice has also issued eight money-saving tips:

Check your bills carefully and read your meter regularly so you can check that you're paying the right amount.

Talk to your supplier if you think your bill is wrong or if you have problems paying. They will give you advice or talk you through repayment options.

Make sure that you are on the cheapest tariff. Check with your supplier and use an accredited tariff-switching website to see who is offering the best deal. Most energy suppliers offer fixed price tariffs, i.e. the price of a unit of energy will stay the same for the length of the deal.

If you use a pre-payment meter, remember that standing charges will be added daily, even when you aren't using energy. Check how much these standing charges are and keep your meter topped up to avoid unexpected charges.

If you use heating oil as your main fuel, buy before winter and see if there are any local oil-buying clubs you can join. A scheme covering many local villages is the Oxfordshire Rural Community Council's Bulk Oil-Buying Scheme - visit www.communityfirstoxon.org/



Make your home energy-efficient. Insulate lofts and cavity walls, install double glazing or use thick curtains to keep the heat in. Get your boiler serviced or replaced to ensure that it is energy-efficient. There are schemes to help pay for this and Citizens Advice can tell you about them.

Save money and energy—don't leave appliances on standby. Fix leaking hot water taps and turn off the light when you leave a room.

Use this check to get a full report with details of your home energy use and the savings you could make.

If money is tight, contact your local Citizens Advice. They can look into your situation and see whether you are getting all the benefits you're entitled to, or if you can get help paying your bills.

Planning

The outline planning application for 14 houses in the field behind the Horse and Harrow has been withdrawn. The Conservation and Design Officer objected to the proposal and said, with respect to West Hagbourne:

"The Horse and Harrow forms the visual gateway to the village as you

travel east along Main Street to the historic core of the settlement. Along this part of Main Street the housing is extremely limited with substantial open green space separating the few houses and the pub from the defined built settlement edge further east The level of development proposed at this site is considered to be far more intense and concentrated than the pattern of development within the settlement. As such, the proposal does not respond to the character of the area or the setting of the Conservation Area."

We expect that a new application will be made, for fewer properties which are hopefully more in character with the village. We will consider such an application if it is made.

The application for a house on the plot next to 17 York Road has been rejected by the planners. They considered that having regard to the size of the site and the contrived plot sub-division, the proposal represents over—development of the site, with inadequate standards of amenity for the occupants of the existing 17 York Road.

Traffic Calming

Three members of the Council met with representatives from Oxfordshire County Council on 6 November, to look around the village and consider in more detail what measures can be taken to slow down through traffic. and to make the route through the village less attractive to through traffic. The expense will be met by Section 106 funds provided by the Bloor Homes developers. Some possible measures might require a traffic survey, but that would not be taken until Hagbourne Hill is open again. Speed bumps will not be used in the village, although there may be a traffic calming feature on the stretch of Main Street from the Horse and Harrow towards the A417.

The existing Vehicle Activated Sign, which was inoperative for some time, has been repaired under warranty.


