Parish Meeting

The Annual Parish Meeting took place on Wednesday 22 May in Hagbourne Village Hall and was attended by 24 villagers and the members of the Parish Council.

The Chairman's report was largely concerned with the recent planning applications that could have serious impacts on the village. It is clear that the land to the south of Didcot that acts as a buffer between Didcot's urban environment and the rural nature of the Hagbournes is under threat from a number of developers despite the published intention of SODC to keep this area as a green gap. There is still much uncertainty about where large scale developments will be built in South Oxfordshire and vigilance is necessary. Within the village, it looks as though 6 or 7 more houses will be built on infill sites and it is hoped these new residents will contribute to the thriving community of West Hagbourne. With regard to traffic, the Harwell Link Road has been opened.

Highways have installed traffic counting apparatus on Main Street, towards the Horse and Harrow. The road narrowing and raised footpath scheme on Main Street alongside Green Thatch has been completed. Signs are being installed indicating that it is a single track stretch of road. The footpath is in use by a number of people and has improved safety. Work was carried out using Section 106 funding from Bloor Homes development to the west of Park Road.

The Parish Council will discuss a possible 20 mph limit in the village at their next meeting.

Reports were received from Hagbourne Cemeteries and the Hagbourne Village Hall committees. Villagers were encouraged to report potholes via 'Report my Street'.

Thanks were offered to Marion Judd, who is planning to move in the next few months, for her contributions to the Village.

The condition of the drainage ditch in Moor Lane was raised (the ghost of Eleanor Bowey perhaps was present !) as it is being used again as a place to dump garden rubbish and the bank is unstable forming a blockage in the stream. (nb the ditch is the responsibility of the landowner in part)

The public rubbish bins are not being emptied again.

This year our district councillor Jane Murphy, now leader of the SODC and our County Councillor Simon Clarke were present and were helpful in explaining how to report potholes at: <https://fixmystreet.oxfordshire.gov.uk/> Simon Clarke advised us that if the pothole is more than 3cm deep this should be mentioned as the council are then obliged legally to fix it within a short space of time and he said that any damage to your vehicle should be reported to the council and then a claim for compensation can be made.

There was some discussion about how the £17,000 section 106 money should be spent. Councillor Clarke explained how to apply for a 20mph limit in the village and that it would cost £7000 to put in place. A vote was taken on this and a majority voted for having a 20mph limit and only one voting against this proposal. This would be funded out of the £17000 still unspent in the village.

Madge Trophy

The winner of this year's Madge Trophy front gardens competition, which was judged at the same time, was Uplands, Main St. where the colourful display of springtime flowers was a delight.

Next year's competition will be judged in May: it is never too early to be planning your spring displays.



Support from your local MP

On Friday 18th May, Ed Vaizey visited West Hagbourne to meet the group campaigning to preserve a green gap between the southern outskirts of Didcot and the Hagbourne's and Coscote.

The MP spent 30 minutes in the village, seeing for himself how the proposed Taylor Wimpey development would change the outlook for West Hagbourne residents.

He agreed that services and infrastructure provision had not kept up with Didcot's recent rapid expansion and proposed to write to SODC expressing his views that further development to the south should not be encouraged.



FAST broadband

After a long wait, the cabinet bringing super fast fibre broadband to West Hagbourne has gone live. After a number of missed deadlines, the service finally arrived in early May.

A number of subscribers have already modified their internet packages to take advantage of the new service. Download speeds of around 50-60 mbps have been reported with upload speeds around 20 mbps.

However, these figures may not be sustained as more people connect to this service. It is still a case of wait and see in terms of the long-term improvement in service.

Fun Run 2018

The 2018 Hagbourne Fun run enjoyed some of the best weather for years. With its usual good turn out, the winning time for the 4.5 mile multi-terrain course was 26m10s, by Jack Shayler.

The fastest time by a woman was 28m38s by Vicki Cronin.

Running is a great way to fitness, using the beautiful local footpaths as your gym - and it's much cheaper. Perhaps you will enter next year's race?

Taylor Wimpey

The consultation process for the Taylor Wimpey application to develop Hagbourne Fields is now closed. Many villagers took the opportunity to register their disapproval of the plans submitted.

They cited the erosion of the separation between West Hagbourne and Didcot, loss of visual amenity, increased traffic and unsuitability of the site in their objections. Banners and posters, paid for by donations, were erected to encourage villagers to submit their comments.

We now await the decision by SODC planning department.

Since the recent announcement by SODC that it can now demonstrate a 5-year housing supply, the protest group are hoping that the council will regain control of which sites in the District are to be developed.

The last week in May also saw the Inquiry into the application by the developers, Catesby, to build on the land at the rear of Loyd Road in Didcot. This application was rejected by SODC as the site is not one allocated in the District's development plans.

The Inquiry took place in Upton and was attended by some villagers, to understand the arguments that might be used with regard to any appeal from Taylor Wimpey.


Marquee hire

Hire of marquees and equipment - the Association has recently reviewed the charges and conditions for the hire of the marquees, tables and chairs.

As from immediate effect, the charge for the hire of either one of the marquees will be £50.00, plus a returnable deposit of £75.00. For the hire of the tables and/or chairs - £50.00, plus a returnable deposit of £75.00. All charges must be paid before the commencement date of hiring and the deposit shall be returned only after an inspection of the hired equipment has been carried out.

We sometimes receive requests for the hire of the equipment from people who live outside the West Hagbourne Parish. In these cases we will now require a sponsor, who must be a village resident and is willing to act as guarantor for the safe return of the hired equipment.
