#### Council elections

**Parish Council** 

The new Council was returned without contest, with only four people prepared to be nominated. Valerie Brownsword, who was a member for several years, decided not to stand again. We shall miss her, and I want to thank her for all her help over the years.

The Council are pleased to report that Louise Beaumont has agreed to be the fifth councillor and she will be formally co-opted in the next Council meeting at the start of July.

#### Highways

The extension of the footpath along Main Street, currently from the pond to Green Thatch, did not take place as exploratory work found that tree roots were a problem.

Some long-overdue signs have now been installed but they do not state that this part of Main Street is a single-track road. We are taking this up with Highways.

We are hoping to install a 20-mph speed limit in York Road and arrangements have been

made for a traffic survey to be carried out by Highways. Provided the current average speed is under 24 mph, we should be able to have the limit changed. Although the limit would probably not affect speeds very much, it will remind drivers that this is a residential street and they should be careful.

We still have up to £25,000 in the Section 106 kitty to spend and are looking into projects. If any villager have suggestions for Highways projects, please let us know.

## **Annual Parish Meeting Report**

#### **Cemetery Committee**

The balance of the Cemetery fund is reported as £7,597.04

The Lych Gate has moved very slightly but is not a danger at present.

OCC have been asked to paint white lines between the road and the lay-by and put up signs to indicate that it is for cemetery parking only.

A database for registering graves has been purchased from Epitaph and data are currently being entered into the database.

Due to problems with the use and emptying of Cemetery waste bins, Grundon has been employed to supply, on hire, a large bin which they will empty fortnightly. It will be positioned just inside the double gates.

Cemetery regulations do not currently include a front to back measurement for a stone, only that their height does not exceed 3 foot 6 inches. All workmanship must adhere to BS8145. Stone masons have been reminded they must include the plot number on a memorial. In response to requests for memorials, EHPC's written policy states that the council will consider only non-living memorials such as a bench. It has been established that, while the burial ground is not consecrated, it was blessed by the Bishop of Reading when it opened.

#### Village Hall

Income increased by 5.7% during 2018 mainly through casual bookings. The main users

continue to be the pre- school. Higher expenditure for the year was largely due to architects' fees for the new storage facility to be built off the small hall but additional catering items were also bought and the village hall sign has been illuminated.

A review of buildings and contents insurance, using a new insurer, resulted in a small rebate. A safety risk assessment found no cause for concern: a fire risk assessment led to improved fire and safety signage. An electrical safety check and asbestos survey were also carried out and will be acted upon. A roof condition survey is to be carried out.

Detailed plans have been drawn up and planning permission obtained to build a permanent storage area accessible from within the small hall. The work is scheduled for the summer holidays in 2019 and grants are being sought.

The land adjacent to the Village hall car park has been bought by Mactaggart & Mickel. They held discussions at the village hall with all interested parties and seem to have taken account of comments made. In their planning applications for Reserved Matters and Discharge of Conditions the village hall car park is being allocated an additional 20 spaces (more than the 14 specified in the planning approval). In addition, they hope to provide the maximum number of parking spaces allowed by the district council rules and 22 garages on their site.

#### Village Association

Unfortunately, our Summer walk was cancelled due to very hot weather. However, the Autumn walk, the longest attempted by the Village Association, was enjoyed by eleven keen walkers. The Winter walk consisted of a smaller group who walked three miles in spite of the cold weather. In July 2019 Sheila Taylor will lead a history trail around the village and a visit to St. Andrew's Church in East Hagbourne - see front page for further details.

The Coffee Morning on Saturday, 15 September 2018 raised £989 for Macmillan Cancer Support. Our thanks go to Mr and Mrs Richard Allen for their help and use of their facilities at York Farm and all who contributed to make this event such a success.

At the AGM, held in the Horse and Harrow on 12 November 2018, the following were elected: Chairperson: Val Walton, Vice Chairman: Ian Leishman, Treasurer: June Little, Secretary: Margaret Leishman.

The Executive Committee are Bridget Pickup, Rob Griffiths, Hazel Rack, Betty Kendrick, Pierre Aller, Eva Pinkava, Emma Rickard and Rob Rickard.

Rob Griffiths is responsible for the hire of the marquees and tables and chairs.

Over the festive period, WHVA again sponsored a tree at the St Andrew's Christmas Tree Festival whilst on a wet December night dedicated singers revived the custom of serenading villagers with traditional carols. A sum of £200 was sent to Crisis UK, a charity which helps the homeless. Thanks to Margaret Leishman for organising the event.

#### **Open Forum**

Several issues were raised at the open forum, part of the Annual Parish Meeting. The Clerk will raise the issue of hemlock (a poisonous weed) growing on the footpath at the back of the Drew's farm with the appropriate authority and highlight fly tipping in the ditch in Moor Lane with SODC once photographic evidence and its precise location has been received

The Clerk is to write to Cllr. Murphy about the closure by Taylor Wimpey of the footpath that runs from the village to Didcot to ensure that it is re-opened when the development is finished in 2021. He will also contact Highways to enquire about the maintenance of the roundabout at the A417/Hagbourne Hill junction which is situated half in West Hagbourne Parish and half in Upton Parish.

A request was made for the Parish Transport representative to ensure that, if there are planned changes to the bus route or timetable, these are communicated not only via email, and the website but also by a notice at the bus stop for the non-connected villagers.

## Planning

Three houses are being built in the old garden of the Horse & Harrow public house. Two of these have been clad in grey panels, rather than the stained weatherboards originally specified. The Parish Council objected to the planners, seeking enforcement of conditions of the planning consent. The Planning Department followed up their comments and uncovered, in a series of interactions with the developers, that a misunderstanding had arisen. The developers had submitted a sample of cladding material in a different colour, but clearly stated that the colour they planned to use was cream/grey. Although the planning officer and conservation officers accept that they approved the colour submitted, rather than the one described in the application, they feel that no material harm

is done by allowing the present colour, acknowledging that this was the one proposed by the developers all along.

An overflow car park with a grass base is being constructed on the piece of land across the road from the pub. The publican has applied for planning consent for a further house on the other side of the overflow car park. The Parish Council objected and the application was refused. The plot between the pub's site and Scotland's Ash garage, has planning consent, granted when SODC could not demonstrate a three-year housing supply, which it now has. We shall see what happens if those are built, as it may affect the prospects of success for a house next to the overflow car park. There have been no further developments regarding a green gap for West Hagbourne.

## Ivor Glyn Jones ('Glyn')

25 August 1933 – 23 March 2019

Glyn Jones passed away peacefully on 23 March, aged 88, after a brave battle with cancer. Glyn and wife Daphne, a former member of Didcot Choral Society, were married for 66 years, moving to the Didcot area in 1977. Glyn was a much-loved member of Didcot Bowls club, representing the club at county level, and serving as both Treasurer and Green-Keeper for more than 20 years. Speaking at the funeral service at East Hagbourne church on 4 April the club's Secretary Gordon Evans, described him as the club's greatest single contributor.

Glyn grew up on the Gower Peninsula, South Wales, the son of a farmer, and retained a lifetime love of the countryside, enjoying especially walks along the old railway embankment near Upton and beyond. He was both inventive and practical, contributing new techniques and building equipment as part of his work as an analytical chemist at the AERE at Harwell. His former colleagues remember him as an exemplary public servant, always approachable and supportive, and ready to smile and pass on his knowledge.

He had many interests beyond science, bowls and the countryside. He played and watched competitive sport all his life, and as a fan of rugby, relished Wales' victory at the 2019 Six Nations Cup. He was a season ticket holder at Reading Football Club, attending with his son and grandson. Despite his many accomplishments, Glyn was always quietly spoken, patient and modest, with a lively sense of humour – a gentleman in every sense. A loving husband to Daphne, father to David and Philip, grandfather to Melanie, Kerry, Laura, Daniel and Simon, and a greatgrandfather six times over, he will be greatly missed.


