Village History Walk

On a sunny June afternoon a small group of villagers and a couple of dogs set off from the war memorial-cum-bus shelter on a history trail round the village. As we headed in the direction of the pond, we noted Wycherts which had once been two three-storey thatched dwellings with its own bread oven. Then on past the last remaining bit of cob wall – there were once at least four around the village.

Next we visited the site of the medieval Chapel of Ease behind Chapel Hayes. Margaret and Ian had kindly laid out the site for us along the lines of the walls, as identified by the Berks Archaeological Research Group

survey in 2004. The group expressed surprise that it was much bigger than expected.

On down to the pond where we heard about the original lords of the manor – a dynasty founded by Walter de Windsor, so named

because he was made first constable of Windsor Castle by William the Conqueror. The present house, built on the site of the original manor dates from the 17th Century.

Ivy Farm, adjacent to the pond,

once served as a shop and post office; the old entrance now covered with ivy. Opposite stands Blissetts, probably named after John Blisset, one of the owners as far back as 1665.

We continued past Green Thatch, at one time a sweet shop, turned the corner into York Road, previously called Town Piece Road, walked by Ash Farm and turned into what was once Village Street. We paused outside York Farm, where the very oldest part is believed to date from 1264/65 and probably contemporary with the original Windsor Manor. It became known as York Place after the York family who lived there in the late 14th Century.

New Councillor

At the council meeting on 2nd July 2019 we formally co-opted Louise Beaumont as our fifth councillor. We would like thank her for joining the council. Contact details for all parish councillors can be found on the website.

Highways at Oxfordshire County Council have agreed to have another visit to the village to discuss how best we can spend

the remainder of the Section 106 money that was allocated to us. They are currently working on who will attend, and we will be discussing when the visit will take place.

It has been agreed that the bench at the bottom of the Chestnut tree will be joined by a new bench on the other side of the tree. This will be funded partly by the village History Group and partly by the Parish Council, using some of a

payment under the Community Infrastructure Levy resulting from building developments in the village.

End of an Era

Work to demolish the final three cooling towers of the now-closed Didcot A Power Station will take place on Sunday 18th August, with the chimney set for removal later in the autumn. The event, long awaited locally, was delayed by investigations surrounding the deaths of three demolition workers in 2016. The company Brown and Mason have been contracted to carry out the work.

As yet the exact time for the demolition has not been announced, but a spokesperson for the owners RWE said that everything would be done to



minimise disruption locally making it likely it will be another early start for those who want to watch the towers fall. For safety reasons the immediate area

surrounding the site will probably be closed so the best vantage points are likely to be the downs or Wittenham Clumps.

Cyclists - have your say



From there we quickly moved on to Woodleys which we know dates from 1688 because that date is carved into one of the central beam supports. Next door there had once been an orchard and malt house. Then across the road to Moor Lane and Thatch Cottage on the corner. One of the upstairs rooms was used as a chapel by

the Reverend Edwin George Bullock (aka Father Antony) in 1904. He also owned the cottage next door where a chapel had been established in 1834. It was restored in 1953 and named Enard Cottage. We moved on down Moor Lane and slipped through to Foxglove Lane, reaching Grove Manor Farm which was once our second manor, then called Watlington. In 1600 it was part of the de Windsor estate.

A smaller group of us walked

along School Path to St Andrew's Church. There we learned about the reconstruction of the south aisle and Lady Chapel by John York and his wife Clarice, widow of William de Windsor in the 15th Century. They are buried in the south aisle and their brasses and that of their son John and his wife are on the wall of the aisle.

Clarice de Windsor came from the well-connected Drokensford family and her family crest, together with those of the York

and de Windsor families are painted on three of the quarter foils on the font. They are reproduced in their full glory in three lights in the Window of Vision at the east end of the south aisle.

When our little band of historians arrived at the church we were welcomed with tea and cake by the West Hagbourne Village Association which also organised the trail.

For those who take an interest in such things, this is the Platinum anniversary and the Queen and Duke of Edinburgh celebrated theirs in November 2017.

Soldiers of Oxfordshire

The new exhibition, Normandy 75: Oxfordshire to the Orne, goes on display at the Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum from 7th August – 3rd November 2019. The exhibition combines a travelling exhibition from the National Army Museum with stories, collected from around Oxfordshire, and told through objects, a map of key locations, and quotes from Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire-born soldiers who served on D Day and beyond. Soldiers from the Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry were some of the first to set foot in Normandy on the 6th of June 1944, and were perhaps most famous for the capture of Pegasus Bridge in the early hours of the morning, prior to the beach landings. Visitors can put themselves in the shoes of these soldiers and sit inside a life-size reproduction of a Horsa Glider's compartment and listen to recorded interviews of D Day

veterans. A Collections Day on the 2nd November will encourage members of the public to bring objects to the museum and tell their stories of Oxfordshire from the Second World War to the 1970's. Any objects donated or loaned on the day will be used to form our Second World War and Reminiscence displays.

The Museum, in the grounds of the Oxfordshire Museum, Park Street, Woodstock, is open from Tuesday-Friday 10am-5pm, Saturday 11am-5pm and Sunday 2pm-5pm.



Traffic to and from this new Care Home will exit the site using the same road that serves the supermarket which could lead to congestion in this area, coming so close as it does to the roundabout.

There is also an application to develop the old Didcot A Power Station land, providing housing and employment sites (P19/S1967/FUL) which might be interesting to watch. The initial consultation period is over but there are likely to be opportunities to feedback as details of the development become clearer.

Planning

A number of planning items might be of interest to villagers:

The decision on an application to erect a single storey rear extension at 2a Manor Close is expected in August.

Some detail is provided about building materials and drainage for a 70-bedroom Care Home to be built adjacent to Aldi supermarket in the Lower Broadway (see P18/S1475/FUL for details of the original proposal), replacing existing buildings beside the railway line.
