Vacancy

Dog Waste

The Parish Council can only place waste bins at locations where they can be reached by the people who come round to empty the bins. Dog walkers whose dogs leave mess on paths, away from the roads,

must collect it and take it to the bins on the roads or take it the their own waste facilities at home.

New Highways Works in the Village

I have written again to the contact at Highways who is dealing with these works but he is away for a few weeks so there is no progress report.

Road Safety Issues for Drivers

I have asked to be placed in contact with someone else at Highways to discuss the various issues affecting drivers travelling south down Main Street towards the bend by the pond. There are

no clear white lines, the existence of the bend is not clearly marked, there is no indication that immediately after the bend the road narrows to single track use and there may be a queue of traffic waiting, and the existence of the new kerb projecting into the road is not clear. There are clear safety issues and they need to be dealt with

Pavement along Main Street

Following my submissions on Fix My Street about the general state of the pavement, I have been advised that this is with technicians for consideration for future programmed works. However there is no available

funding for this financial year although the worst section has been marked. Whether that will be repaired I do not know.

Garden Waste

Please note that this must be disposed of at the council tip if it is



too much for your brown bins. It must not be dumped on paths or in the countryside.

The next parish council meeting will be on 4th November on Zoom. Anybody wishing to raise a point should set it out fully to the Parish Clerk well in advance of the meeting.

Covid-19: Update

Increasingly people have been turning up at Oxfordshire hospitals, asking to be tested for Covid-19. This is possibly as a result of the national issue with testing capacity, where people have struggled to book a test online. OCC joins the NHS and Public Health colleagues to clarify that people with symptoms must NOT go to a hospital. Testing does not take place in hospital settings and by turning up people are putting extra strain on resources by having to turn people away and also potentially putting vulnerable people at risk.

If you are struggling to book a test online, the advice is to keep trying as it's only possible to book a slot when one becomes available. Slots become available throughout the day so it may take a few attempts at different times of

the day. Please only book a test if you're displaying symptoms.

You can book a test by calling 119 or by registering online via *gov.uk/getting-tested- forcoronavirus.*

HUGS

Hello! We'd like to tell vou about a new sustainability group called HUGS, the Hadbournes and Upton Group for Sustainability. We formed in lockdown having had the time to appreciate nature more as well as to think about the future. We took part in the Climate Coalition's 'The Time is Now Campaign' to ask MPs for a greener recovery from Covid-19 - an economic recovery that tackles both the climate crisis and the dramatic decline in UK wildlife.

HUGS main aims

- To work with other groups in the area to ensure plans and policies for our communities are compatible with achieving a healthy, nature-rich, low-carbon future.

- To help nature through supporting existing conservation work around our 3 villages, and also starting new projects that promote greater biodiversity.

- To share information about how we can all live more sustainably - whether in our homes, our gardens or our lifestyles. And to develop projects that help us live more sustainably together (e.g. a local pop-up refill station to reduce plastic use).

We've been busy at HUGS. Canvassing local opinion at the Hagbourne Produce Show identified tree planting, a repair cafe, a pop-up refill station and wilding of verges and other areas as future projects for HUGS and our growing band of volunteers.

First, try our 3 Village Wild Walk!, a 2 mile circular route connecting the 3 villages along footpaths and the cycle track (https://www.hugsustainability.or g/walk for a printable map and directions) mainly on metalled paths. Great for autumnal and wintery walks as well as spring and summer. The route offers expansive views and the chance to look for wildlife across the seasons. As well as the cemetery wildflower meadow and Mowbray Fields Nature Reserve, there's a top 10 wildlife spotting list for kids too, making it a great family activity! Do have a look and we'd be delighted to see any pictures you take and to hear about wildlife you find along the way. See our juvenile wheatear photograph.
