MADGE TROPHY FRONT GARDENS COMPETITION

The Madge Trophy competition took place on 10th July. This year's judges, Caroline and Laurie Hunt from East Hagbourne, enjoyed walking round the village and commented on its community feel and communal planting that benefits villagers and pollinators alike! Caroline is a member of the HUGS committee and her daughter Laurie is currently studying wildlife conservation at university. It was a pleasure escorting the judges around the village and seeing many

gardens in their colourful, summer splendour. The result and report is as follows:

Many of the gardens were prettily planted. For the Madge Trophy this year we were looking for a balance of garden design as well as wildlife friendliness. Wildlife Friendliness includes providing shelter, food and water for wildlife. It also involves sympathetic gardening such as composting and using water butts as well as avoiding chemicals (such as slug pellets). We noticed the diversity of wildflowers in lawns around the village. We particularly liked the lawn of No 4 Manor Close which was rich in species diversity. The corner verge of Crossways on York Road was a nice mix of native and cultivated plants, offering both shelter and food for invertebrates.

Our winner is Lilley Cottage. The front garden was a charming mix of colourful flowers and shrubs, in a soft naturalist, sympathetic design. Good mix of shelter and food for wildlife (especially pollinators).

Highly commended gardens are Green Thatch with a beautiful

Rapid plant growth at the present means that there is a risk of hedges and other vegetation extending over pavements and footpaths, as well as obstructing road signs. Richard James Allen 4th April 1926 – 30th June 2021



Born at York Farm, the youngest of five children of Ernest William Allen and Phoebe Susannah Allen (nee Townsend), Richard was educated at Hagbourne Church of England Primary School and Wallingford Grammar School. Leaving at the age of 16, and already serving in the ATC and the Home Guard, he embarked on his farming career with his parents and siblings. In 1948 he formed a partnership with his brother David and together they modernised, mechanised and embraced the changes in agriculture that were required to feed the nation after the shortages of WW2.

In 1949 Richard married Gladys Mary Lay from Steventon and between 1950 and 1957 two boys and two girls completed their family. However, in 1968 the eldest son James William aged 18 years lost his life, whilst working on a farm in Denmark.

The existing small herd of dairy cows at York Farm was developed and reached its capacity in the 1980's of 130 head and sustained until 2007 when the herd was dispersed as expansion was not an option due to the location within the village and market forces. This was the end of milk production in West Hagbourne and many of the surrounding villages.

Other enterprises were developed with his brother. Pigs at Zulu Farm, Harwell and later at Blewbury and North Stoke, Wallingford. A flock of 450 ewes was kept and the arable crops included quality milling wheat, malting barley, oats, feed beans, rape for oil, peas and carrots for the Samor canning factory in Park Road in the 1960's and more recently soya and sunflowers. They farmed a mixture of light downland chalk, greensand and a heavier loam soil at Sheencroft, all requiring different farming methods which they learned about and embraced and which was key to their farming success.

He served on the West Hagbourne parish council for many years and was a mine of information on water courses, where pipes were laid and footpaths. Also a keen supporter of the local Farming Club, he attended meetings, socials and always entered the farm competitions. His farming life spanned nine decades, from the horse drawn plough and steam threshing machines to satellite mapped fields and driverless tractors, from 1 ton to the acre to 5 ton to the acre. It was his willingness to embrace change and adopt new methods and support the next generation in their changes that added to the success of what is now a successful sustainable agriculturally based business.

Very much the family man, in his younger days he holidayed in Weymouth, Hastings and Bournemouth and later travelled the world visiting 26 countries.

Verges

A recent study by the Centre for Ecology and Hydrology in Crowmarsh calls for the country's roadside verges to be managed for nature. Nationwide, verges represent an area the size of Dorset. Given that an area of grass with just dandelions can support 93 species of insect, that represents a huge potential to support biodiversity. Verges are key for pollinators, who in turn feed birds and other animals.

Since the 1930s we've lost 97% of our wildflower meadows in the UK. Verges could help towards reversing that trend. According to Trevor Dines of Plantlife, if all our verges were managed for nature there would be an incredible 418,99 billion more wildflowers in the country, that's 6,300 per person. How amazing would that be?! He enjoyed the company of his beloved wife Mary, three children, their partners, nine grand children, their partners and four great grand children, countless relations and many many friends. He hosted parties, functions and celebrations at York Farm for his family and his beloved village of West Hagbourne.

His passing has brought to an end the 102 year occupancy of York Farm house by the Allen male line and so begins another chapter for the history of this iconic building built in the 1500's in the centre of West Hagbourne.

Nature's Eye

On 18 July I witnessed the return to my garden of a female Rousels's Bush Cricket (shortwinged form). After the dearth of insects in my garden over the past two years, it was good to see this spectacular insect. Another welcome return, two days earlier, was that of a male Common Darter, probably the commonest British dragonfly. We walked to the lake on the Great Western development on 16 July via the track at the end of York Road (now overgrown with nettles and other vegetation) in the hope of seeing dragonflies and saw a couple of Southern Hawkers and a Broad-bodied Chaser.
