20 mph speed limit

A while back the Parish Council asked for York Road to be given a 20 mph speed limit. Last year a request was made to the County Council for the village to be given 20 mph signs, at the suggestion of our County Councillor. It will assist with consideration of these requests if we consult with residents. We are therefore asking residents to use the survey sheet accompanying this newsletter, to indicate whether you would support a 20 mph limit to be applied to the whole of the village; or to specific parts only; or not at all. Your

responses can be delivered to the letter box of the chair of the council, Michael Butler, at Blissetts, Main Street; or sent by email to the Parish Clerk. In the email you need only use the numbers given on the survey sheet to identify items concerned and then indicate your responses.

Fuel Costs

Thousands of council taxpayers in South Oxfordshire will soon receive a £150 council tax 'rebate' to help with rising energy bills. Most households in council tax bands A-D eligible.

This 'rebate' will not be taken off people's council tax bills when they are issued but will be made as a separate payment as soon as possible.

If you pay by Direct Debit the £150 should be paid directly into your bank account from the end of April. If you do not pay by Direct Debit the council will need to write to you to confirm your bank details. This may take longer to process. If you are not on direct debit, you can still sign up now as this will help to

ensure that you'll receive the money as soon as possible.

Limited funding will also be made available for households in need who would not otherwise be eligible for this energy rebate. This will be a local discretionary scheme and details will be made available on the council's website in due course.

Jean Kearsey

Jean Kearsey, who lived in West Hagbourne for many years, died in March 2022, aged 90. Long term residents may remember when Jean and her husband Hugh were active members of the village. They came to the area when they married in 1955, living first in East Hagbourne and then Abingdon, before buying a plot of land in West Hagbourne and having a house built. That house is Dormer Cottage. After spending three years in Holland for Hugh's work, they moved back to Dormer Cottage where Jean

raised her family of three boys, before starting working for antiquarian bookseller, John Lawson, in East Hagbourne. She loved her garden and was active in local groups, including spending many years on the Parish Council, only giving up when they downsized to a bungalow in Upton. During her time on the Parish council, Jean was involved in instigating the village clean up programme as well as entering West Hagbourne in the Best Kept Village competition. In later years, they moved to Gloucestershire be near their children. Hugh died in July 2020

Nature's Eye

The warm weather in March has meant that many butterflies have emerged a little earlier than average. I have already had many sightings of male Brimstones in my garden. After they have established territories by the end of March, I expect to see females. Their wings are much paler in colour than the males, being almost white. A few years ago they would be laying their eggs on the leaves of Buckthorn (or Alder Buckthorn in acidic soil areas) during May, but they could be laying in April this year if the warm weather persists. With global warming there is a possibility of a mis-match between the period of availability of a butterfly caterpillar's foodplant and the period in which the species is present as the caterpillar. Many research projects are currently working on this.

I have also seen a few Small Tortoiseshells recently. Look out for the first Orange Tips in April. Both of the butterfly images were taken in April, when the Honesty and Aubretia were in full flower.

I see the same Grey Squirrel in my garden almost every day, on the bird feeders (perhaps we should call them squirrel feeders!). Other recent visitors are a Heron, seen on two occasions, and rabbits, which are becoming a serious problem in the north west corner of the village. Their favourite food in my garden is Day Lilies (Hemerocallis) when the shoots are 3-5 cm in height.

The Council

SODC will help in any way they can, showing solidarity in public statements and actions such as flying the Ukrainian flag at the councils' offices at Milton Park as well as resettling refugees. They will work with partner councils to issue consistent communications to residents about how best to help.

Residents

The best route to donate/support is via the Disasters Emergencies Committee which works with 15 charities including Oxfam, Christian Aid and Save the Children.

The Local Sponsorship Scheme for Ukraine will match people, charities, businesses and community groups to Ukrainians who do not have families in the country, so they are able to come the UK. The councils' housing team (email housing@southandvale.gov.uk) is recording all offers of housing and will respond in line with government advice.

In addition to Council initiatives, Helen and her customers and friends at the Horse and Harrow are organising van loads of supplies to be delivered communities bordering Ukraine to help support the huge numbers of refugees arriving. HUGS Update

Where's the buzz? Planting for bees and other pollinators this spring

April is a great month to get out and start planning your garden. This year, plant a new pollinator patch or a new wildflower border so you can look forward to beautiful blooms through summer and hear the buzz of bees and other pollinators enjoying your garden as much as you do!

Sowing from seed

This is the cheapest way to create a new flower bed. You can use annuals for this summer or perennials to enjoy in the years to come. Choose from native and non-native flowers. Just clear your area and scatter the seeds, lightly rake over the surface and water the area. Then wait to see what comes up! Recommended annuals – corn flowers, corn marigold, poppies, wild carrot, cosmos and ammi.

Planting plug plants

If you want to get off to a faster start, choose plug plants. If you want native wildflowers then you could choose the species we have in our Hagbourne
Cemetery Meadow and the
Butts Piece Mini-meadow. Go for oxeye daises, common knapweed, lady's bedstraw, wild marjoram and field scabious.
There are many online nurseries selling native species.

Bigger plants

If you're looking for bigger plants, why not stay local and go along in May to Hagbourne Garden Club's Plant Sale (afternoon of the 14th of May) and get advice on what will grow well locally. Choose from annuals, perennials and shrubs.

A mix of early to late flowering plants is key for pollinators: something already in flower, plus long-flowering plants (such as herbs, cat mint, lavender or others) and late-flowering plants (such as asters and sedums). Planting a range of flowers in different shape and sizes is also helpful for insects. Foxgloves are perfect for bumble bees to feed from as well as to shelter in during a down pour. Small openheaded flowers like achillea are perfect for hover flies and smaller pollinators.

Night and day

We enjoy sitting out on a summer's evening in the garden, so don't forget the night pollinating insects – moths! And do grow some jasmine, hesperis or evening primose for them to enjoy too!

Finally, a plea for darkness - night pollinator lifecycles are severely affected by artificial light - so please remember to turn your outside lights off.

Moor Lane Planting

Those of you who regularly walk along Moor lane will have noticed that the bulbs planted last November are starting to emerge. The next stage of the refurbishment in April, once the soil warms up, will be to prepare the surface for sowing the mixed grass seed and selected wild flowers.

Further along the lane, towards the railway line, a programme of work has started to clear an area for planting wild flowers. This requires the removal of the nettles and hemlock, (which are flourishing after the recent rains).
