At the meeting on 1st March a number of matters were discussed, one of which was the footpath to Upton. It has been noted that the portion of the footpath concerned is after the bridge over the stream. That stream is the boundary between West Hagbourne and Upton and so the sloping portion of the path which needs attention is in the parish of Upton. The Clerk is seeking tenders for the work but has contacted the clerk for Upton parish council to explain the situation so that we can work together on this project.

The government has introduced a requirement for voters to show photo ID when voting at a polling station at some elections. This will apply for the first time in England at the local elections on Thursday 4th May 2023. Accepted forms of photo ID will include, but are not limited to, passport, driving licence (including provisional license), disabled parking blue badge, certain concessionary travel cards and identity cards with PASS mark (Proof of Age Standards Scheme). Anyone who doesn't have accepted photo ID can apply for a free voter ID document, known as a Voter Authority Certificate. The deadline to apply for ID for the local elections is 25 April.

HUGS Update

Dramatic delcine of native British wildflowers

'The loss of habitats is an unmitigated disaster for wildflowers and all the species that depend on them including insects, bats and birds.'

Craig Bennett, Chief Executive The Wildlife Trusts

Over half of Britain and Ireland's native plants have declined over the past 20 years (Botanical Society of Britain and Ireland). We are losing on average one species per year per county (Plantlife).

Why we should worry

Fewer of these plants means fewer pollinators.

Species at risk

Heathers and Harebells have been particularly badly affected. Corn marigold, brought to Britain by Iron Age farmers and once common in our fields, have declined by over 60%.

Why this has happened

Research pins the decline on changes in farming since the 1950s, habitat degradation and changes in grazing. Land

drainage has led to declines in damp loving wild plants, including Devil's-bit scabious – a nectar-rich flower used by many pollinating insects.

What next

Government environment schemes promise to reverse these declines, protect local wildlife sites and protect and enhance biodiversity and the natural environment. We can all help by getting to know our wildflowers better, and cherishing them.

So get sowing this Spring, plant wildflowers in your garden, and come along to help HUGS plant more wildflowers around the villages !

Nature's Eye

The warm weather in March has meant that many butterflies have emerged a little earlier than average. I have already had many sightings of male Brimstones in my garden. After they have established territories by the end of March, I expect to see females. Their wings are much paler in colour than the males, being almost white. A few years ago they would be laying their eggs on the leaves of Buckthorn (or Alder Buckthorn in acidic soil areas) during May, but they could be laying in April this year if the warm weather persists. With global warming there is a possible mis-match between the period of availability of a butterfly caterpillar's food plant

and the period in which the species is present as the caterpillar. Many research projects are currently working on this.

I have also seen a few Small Tortoiseshells recently. Look out for the first Orange Tips in April. Both of the butterfly images were taken in April, when the Honesty and Aubretia were in full flower.

I see the same Grey Squirrel in my garden almost every day, on the bird feeders (perhaps we should call them squirrel feeders!). Other recent visitors are a Heron, seen twice, and rabbits, which are becoming a serious problem in the north west corner of the village. Their favourite food in my garden is Day Lilies (Hemerocallis) when the shoots are 3-5 cm in height.

Twinning visit to Planegg

The visit this year takes place from Thursday 7th - Sunday 10th September. Those travelling are expected to pay for their own flights (around £200 pp) but on arrival everyone is hosted by a local family and all joint activities are paid for by Planegg. You do not have to be a member of the twinning association in order to join this visit, just interested in finding out about life in our twin town. Didcot and surrounding villages, including West Hagbourne, are twinned with Meylan in France and with Planegg in Germany. Exchanges usually take place in alternate years, although things have been pretty quiet over the past few years. This year, however, we are invited to join a visit to Planegg. This charming town, located to the south-west of Munich has similarities to Didcot in that it is the focus of international research facilities but its surrounding countryside, with forests and lakes, is very different.

New Emergency Alerts service

Emergency Alerts will be used very rarely – only being sent where there is an immediate risk to people's lives – so people may not receive an alert for months, or even years. Their initial use will focus on the most serious severe weather-related incidents, including severe flooding.

A UK-wide alerts test will take place in the early evening of 23rd April which will see you receive a test alert message on your mobile phone. You'll hear a loud, siren-like sound and a message on your screen will tell you about the emergency as well as how best to respond. You'll be able to check an alert is genuine at *gov.uk/alerts.*



Farming & Countryside

Wildlife surveys, drainage and archaeology reports, management plans and planning permission - at long last the riding arena/menage is finished. Although functioning, the website is still being worked on where the main advertising will be. For quite a while it did just look like a muddy pile of earth (the weather has been against us), but it has gradually taken shape and evolved. Once the grass has grown and the wildflowers are planted it should be a lovely place to exercise and train a horse. This are should also be a lovely place to listen to the skylarks as they love the spring crops and grass fields

The kestrels haven't appeared yet. They didn't use the box last year, but maybe it will be desirable this season: we will see. Hopefully the owl boxes will be occupied too. We have installed more nesting boxes around the grounds and for swifts and swallows on the older buildings.

Unfortunately, due to an invasion of the flea beetle, the rape crop has failed so we will have to replant with peas mid-April. The milling wheat and spring malting barley are being planted.

Regenerative farming is very much at the forefront where less chemicals and fertiliser are being used with minimum cultivation to keep the carbon in the ground.

The water table remains low even in the reservoirs, another hose pipe ban this year no doubt.

The spring flowers are beginning to show themselves just a few more sunny days and we will all be smiling again!
