## Parish Council

The first meeting of the new Parish Council was held on 10th May 2013. Four members of the previous council had agreed to stand for the new council as nobody else in the village had indicated a willingness to stand. Oliver Doogue of the previous council had already given notice of his intention to resign after being a member for several years and we are grateful for his help. Michael Butler agreed to be Chair again and Hugh Lewis agreed to be his deputy again.

The Annual Parish meeting was held on 24th May. Twelve members of the public attended. The Horse and Harrow was discussed. The Chair indicated that in the likely event of an appeal against the decision of the District Council to refuse the

planning application to close the pub and change the building to a residence, the Parish Council would negotiate with CAMRA regarding its response. This may involve the use of an expert to give evidence on the viability of a pub.

The Chair indicated that the Parish Council wanted the fifth member of the Parish Council to be a female to provide balance. This remains the case but any volunteers of either gender should indicate their willingness to stand to the Clerk or to any member of the Council.

Any villagers who would like the Council to provide a general purpose skip should advise the Clerk. The number of people who would like a skip will affect whether one is provided.

## Nature's Eye

I have seen only a few swallows and house martins in the village this spring and not a single swift. As usual the first bee flies and damselflies appeared in my garden in early May, but it was in late May that I saw something rather different - a female Crab Spider, Misumena vatia, one of several species of Crab Spider to be found in the UK. The female is about 10 mm across, but the male only 4 mm. The female is usually either white or yellow but can change colour according to her surroundings. This particular one was on the flowerhead of a Doronicum, which is bright yellow. Unlike the majority of spiders, Crab Spiders do not construct webs. When hunting they stand motionless on a flowerhead waiting for the prey to come within range and then pounce.

If you walk down Moor Lane in May, on the right you will see that the dominant wildflower is Garlic Mustard. This is one of the food plants of the caterpillars of the Orange Tip butterfly. The females usually lay their eggs singly just below a

# Water everywhere

The recent drier weather means that we have seen less of Thames Water here in the village this month. A persistent problem outside Wycherts, with water bubbling up through the tarmac, seemed to take some time to resolve and then there was the emergency closure of Main Street by Blissetts as the hole dug filled with water overnight. This has been followed by the tanker being parked on Main Street emptying the sewage system which has been overwhelmed by run off water leaking in during the wet winter. Longer term residents of

flower. They are greenish-white when first laid, turning to yellow, then orange. Although they are only approximately 1.5mm long they are easy to spot once they have reached the yellow stage. I have not found any eggs yet, but there is still time, as they can be laid until the end of June. To attract Orange Tips to my garden I have planted Garlic Mustard seed. It is easy to grow but soon becomes a pernicious weed!

## **HUGS Update**

#### Natural corridors

Seen from above by drone or on Google Earth, our parish consists of big blocks of fields plus smaller blocks and lines of housing. How much room there is for nature here depends on the owner. The farmer for the field and the homeowner or tenant for the garden. However, linking and dividing the fields and houses are natural corridors; the streams, hedgerows, foot paths and road side verges.



Natural corridors are vital for wildlife. Bats navigate using hedgerows, birds nest and feed from hedgerows. Hedgerows are a fantastic habitat for insects. However, hedgerows with gaps in are much less helpful to nature. Grasses, wildflowers and insects rely on verges which provide a continuous string of habitats and food sources.

When you look at the verges along our lanes going out to Coscote, Upton and between the Hagbournes, they are full of cow parsley and other wildflowers through May and June. If we continue this abundance through our villages and up to the long verges of

Didcot, we would connect each verge for plants and insects alike. Insects in turn, feed birds, mammals, reptiles and amphibians. Insects are a key part of the food chain and they need plants to survive.

Long grass is home to butterfly eggs, grasshoppers, ladybirds and many other small insects and their larvae. Wildflowers provide nectar for our beleaguered pollinators. Many of our insects are reliant on certain plants for their survival. Butterfly and moth species tend to rely on one type of plant to lay their eggs on, their caterpillars feeding on them. Without these plants, the insects will disappear.

Wouldn't it be wonderful if all the verges in our village could be lush and long with wildflowers and grasses? Alive with the sound of bees feeding on flowers
