Twinning

Dave and I recently travelled to visit our German twin town. Planegg lies close to Munich and, like Didcot, is a centre for science excellence. During our three days, we had a picnic dinner at a Biergarten, visited a brewery and tasted their beers (including a delicious alcohol-free weissbier) and visited the chapel at Planegg castle. We were also proudly shown the town's major infrastructure project, guaranteeing that the Munich U-bahn reaches Planegg. To ensure this, the town has had to pay for (with some grants from regional government) a kilometre of track to be laid, a station to be constructed and to contribute

towards the cost of one train. Local government is very different in Germany!

Nature's Eye

The results for Butterfly Conservation's annual Big Butterfly Count were recently announced. In the 13th year of the event, over 1.5 million butterflies and day-flying moths were counted by over 95,000 members of B.C. during 136,000 fifteen minute counts between 14 July and 6 August. There was a 25% increase in the total number of butterflies seen compared to that in 2022. Dr. Zoe Randle, Senior Surveys Officer at B.C. said 'The mixed

weather this year has helped, as there has been an abundance of green food plants available for caterpillars and plenty of nectar-rich flowers for adult butterflies. However, while the number of butterflies recorded this summer has been the highest since 2019, the long-term trends show worrying declines for some of the UK's most common butterfly species.'

The most-seen species this year was the Red Admiral (248,077 recorded, an increase of 338% on the 2022 number). This is the first time that this species has taken the top spot. Gatekeeper was next (222,896, down 28%), followed by Large White (216,666) then Small White (190,506), both moderate increases. Next, Holly Blue had another good year (particularly in my garden), up by 41%. Species seeing a decline included Brimstone, Ringlet, Common Blue, and Speckled Wood (see image), also Meadow Brown, Peacock and Small Tortoiseshell. I did not see a single Painted Lady this year,

but the national count was 11,893, an increase of 113%!

Butterfly populations have always fluctuated, and the ultimate effects of such phenomena as habitat loss, increased summer rain and global warming are difficult to predict. On the bright side, in the last few years, several species from mainland Europe have been recorded in the UK, notably the Short-tailed Blue, one of which was photographed at the Aston Rowant National Nature reserve in the Chilterns recently.

HUGS Update

Supporting biodiversity in Wilcher Close

In September it was great to meet the Board of Soha at Wilcher Close. HUGS have been working with Soha and The Poet's Trail in East Hagbourne. At Rymans Crescent we planted wildflower turf last autumn which has had a fantastic first flowering season this year.

At Wilcher Close, we explored together with residents proposals to make two areas of mown grass more attractive to nature (and humans too!). Planting took place in March and April. This included; semi-dwarf fruit trees, edible hedging, native shrubs, perennial wildflowers and native bulbs.

As the planting matures it should provide shelter and food source for a range of wildlife across the year. In Spring, early wildflowers such as dandelions and blossom from fruit trees and hedging provide vital nectar to pollinators. Hedging is a place of shelter for birds and insects. Flower nectar in summer helps feed butterflies, moths, hoverflies, bees, wasps and other insects. Supporting insects means supporting other wildlife higher up the food chain such as birds and bats. The leaves of some plants also provide food for caterpillars of butterflies and moths. Longer grass itself feeds crickets and

grasshoppers and gives home to insect life.

In autumn and winter, the seed heads of flowers are left to feed birds. Fallen fruit on the ground will be enjoyed by birds, insects as well as any passing mammals such as hedgehogs. Some longer grass and the shelter from hedging and trees also helps create habitat for insect life through the colder months. Two beautifully painted lecterns made from recycled plastic have now been installed at Wilcher Close. These have been illustrated by Linda Benton from The Poet's Trail.

Is there a location in West Hagbourne that might be suitable for a similar wilding process? Caroline and Ian would be delighted to receive suggestions from WH residents.
