Verge maintenance

Many thanks to local farmers the Drewes from Coscote Farm and Nick Lay from Hare Chase Partners for doing a great job in cutting back the verges around our village - particularly on Coscote Road, A 417, and Hagbourne Hill.

Not only has this helped prevent the further spread of pernicious weeds like hemlock, giant hogweed, and ragwort, (now rampant in Oxfordshire due to the Councils delaying verge cutting) but it has improved road visibility and therefore safety hugely. Much appreciated

Nature's Eye

In recent weeks, I have spent a considerable time in the garden preparing for the recent village open gardens day. Normally at this time of year, one would expect to see plenty of butterflies, particularly on sunny days. Instead, during June, I cannot recall seeing more than two during a day's gardening. Even my large Buddleia attracted only one or two individuals in a day. I have noticed over the years that Gatekeeper butterflies (the most numerous species in Butterfly Conservation's annual 'Big Butterfly Count' last year) usually make their first appearance to coincide with the appearance of bramble blossom. This is in mid- to late June. This year I had to wait until mid-July. Earlier, only Red Admiral, Holly Blue and Orange Tip were seen in reasonable numbers.

On the brighter side, those who visited my garden on the open day will have noticed the numerous Azure Damselflies on my pond. In June there was a pair of Large Red Damselflies

present. There is also a Small Red Damselfly, rare in the UK but locally common at Parsonage Moor near Abingdon.

HUGS Update

Butterflies

While some species increased, 2023 saw worrying declines in others (UK Butterfly Monitoring Scheme). It was the great year for Chequered Skipper, Brimstone, Large Blue and the Red Admiral who now overwinters in the UK as our climate warms. 2023 also saw the lowest numbers for 48 years for the Small Pearl-Bordered Fritillary and Small Tortoiseshell. Butterflies are useful environmental indicators, reflecting habitat, pollution and climate change.

To do your bit, plant flowering plants: Scabious, Verbena, Alliums and Lavender to provide food; leave grass long, nettles, brambles, logs and leaves as shelter for butterfly caterpillars.

Gladys Mary Allen 'Mary'

Mary was born 4th February 1927 and spent the majority of her childhood living on the village green at Steventon. After a local education she worked for a short time at the Army depot switch board on the Hanney Road.

Her initial trips to West Hagbourne were to Manor Farm to visit her father's brother John Lay and his wife Elizabeth (Nee Napper) along with their children, in particular Charlie Lay her favorite cousin. It was there in 1947 she met Charlie's friend and neighbouring farmer Richard Allen, the youngest of five children born to Ernest William Allen & Phoebe Suzanne (Nee Townsend), who had occupied York Farm since 1901.

Mary married Richard in 1949 at Steventon Church and returned to York Farm where she lived for the next 77 years. In the early years, as well as rearing four children. Marv was busy helping her mother-in-law care for her father-in-law who had suffered a severe stroke, who lived next door at York Farm Cottage. York Farmhouse, although clean, was in very poor condition, it was not until the 1950s that an inside toilet was installed, and the central heating in the early 1970s.

Up until 2007 cows were still being milked at York Farm and Mary's contribution was the rigorous washing of the dairy towels each week: she was delighted when she finally got an automatic washing machine. Calving cows, feeding calves, rearing orphan lambs, gardening, learning to drive, feeding farm staff were just a few of the skills she had to learn being new to the world of farming, but she took it all in her stride and made an invaluable contribution to the success of the farming business.

Outside of farm life Mary enjoyed her voluntary work being a driver for the Blind Association and an active member of the Ladies Conservative Association at Abingdon. It was not unusual to see her take on the catering for their annual Christmas lunch single handed. Mary enjoyed cooking, her Sunday roasts and shoot dinners were legendary, huge joints of roast beef and an endless supply of Yorkshire puddings were produced from the most modest of facilities followed by nearly always sherry trifle. The guests loved it.

Mary's life also endured tragedy. In 1968 she lost her first born son James William aged 18 years, a loss that left a sadness in her heart for the rest of her life. Her other three children all married and together gave her nine grandchildren and nine great grandchildren who gave her so much love and pleasure, all living locally and regular visitors to York Farm.

In 2003 Mary experienced the onset of age related macular degeneration, an eye condition which gradually worsened over the years, resulting in the loss of her diving licence. However she persevered with great stoicism, continued to knit, cook and make the most of what she was able to do: most people were unaware she suffered from the condition.

Once the children had left home, Mary and Richard enjoyed their time together at York Farm, watching their family grow, continuing to play an active role on the farm, enjoying holidays and entertaining until Richards death in 2021, a wonderful marriage that lasted 72 years.

Mary continued to live on her own, assisted by a stream of family and friends who enabled her to stay at York Farm for the following twenty two months until her death on 16th May 2024.

Parish Council

The West Hagbourne Parish Council continues its work on a number of areas of importance to the village, as follows:

Flooding

We have been in regular contact with the County Council in relation to the operation and condition of the watercourses and drainage channels through and around the village, including a couple of site visits. We are identifying potential work which needs to be undertaken to make the system more functional and resilient, and are pressing for this work to be done before the winter (we have applied for a grant to support this). Those on the village WhatsApp group will have seen Robin's request for information from anyone who has experienced flooding in the village - both this year and historically. Many thanks to all those who have shared their experiences so far; any further information should be sent to robin.wilkes@westhagbourne.org. All of this information is very important in helping us to do what we can to address this key issue

Planning

The rejected planning application for the land opposite the Horse & Harrow site (six houses) has been appealed to the Secretary of State. The PC will maintain its opposition to the application and will share information with residents about how they can also submit their views on the appeal (this will have happened prior to publication of this newsletter).

Moor Lane

The byway remains closed. We continue to chase the County Council for information about the remedial works which will be required, and plans for future access.

Vehicle Activated Signs

EW have requested that these are reset to correspond to the applicable 20mph limit.

Speedwatch

We thanked the Speedwatch team for their continued efforts in encouraging traffic to comply with the applicable speed limit.

Highways

The PC will be meeting the County Council's "Engagement Team" to discuss issues with traffic speed and volume.

Hagbourne Village Hall

A significant project is planned to replace the roof of the village hall. Initially, a feasibility study will be commissioned to confirm the right approach. We, along with the East Hagbourne Parish Council, will provide support to the Hall Committee during this process

Hagbourne Cemetery

A flooding survey is required due to issues in part of the cemetery. Our PC covers 25% of cemetery costs (East Hagbourne PC covering the rest) and will remain involved in the work through Julie, our representative on the Cemetery Committee.

Finally, the Trust for Oxfordshire's Environment has a number of grants available for wildlife and environmental projects (from £1000 to £25,000). The PC is keen to support an application if we can; please do let me know if vou have any ideas for a project in the village which might be considered (the application deadline is 7 October).


