## **HUGS Update**

### Summer in the garden

Summer is the time to be outside and enjoying the sights and sounds of nature. What better place than your back garden? Hopefully you've been serenaded by the sound of fledgelings during May and June and will still hear more baby birds during July and August. To help them, do avoid hedge cutting until September so their nests are safe and undisturbed.

Leaving grass long and having a wild corner (or more) is also a fantastic support for birds, as they need insects (especially the young) to feed on.

Long grass is a place that butterflies lay their eggs — another reason to mow less often or not at all in some areas if you can. If you're keen to help butterflies, have a look at the Big Butterfly Count (bigbutterflycount.butterflyconservation.org). It's just takes 15 minutes to count butterflies and day-flying moths in your garden (on one day between the 18th of July and the 10th of August).

And if you're off to the garden centre soon, a large RHS study found that the best way to help promote a healthy ecosystem in the garden is to use native plants (flowers, bulbs, shrubs and trees) and to plant them densely.

## Parish Council

## Meetings

We had our regular bi-monthly PC meeting on 2nd July. Our next regular PC meeting will be on Wednesday 10th September, 7.30pm at Hagbourne Village Hall. Please do contact the Clerk or any Parish Councillor if you have a matter which you would like the PC to consider at our next meeting. Agenda and minutes of all PC meetings can be found on the village website.

#### **Planning**

We welcome residents coming to us for pre-application advice (we had one to consider), and please do remember to check the planning rules before committing to any development. We have also been keeping an eye on a planning application in Upton for a travellers' site (near The George).

#### Roads

The Community Speedwatch team continues to do sterling work to monitor speed levels

along Main Street and report offenders to Thames Valley Police. The roadside speedindicator signage has at last been replaced to correspond with the new 20mph limits.

## Drainage

The Flood Group continues to turn out on a regular basis to clear ditches and drains, and we continue to liaise with OCC on significant related projects. The PC has approved a budget for the Flood Group to finish the clearing of invasive weed in the Moor Lane ditch. Please remember that we maintain a stock of sandbags in the village for emergencies.

### Phone Box/Noticeboards

The phone box has now been refurbished; next on our list is the repair and upgrade of the village noticeboards.

#### Moor Lane

We have the support of our OCC and SODC councillors, local farmers and East Hagbourne PC in our efforts to prevent recreational 4WDs and motorbikes from using the Moor

Lane byway. We are currently assessing available options with OCC.

### Security

A couple of residents have reported some unexpected late night callers in the last few weeks. It may be completely innocent, but it is a good reminder to keep outbuildings locked and generally to be aware of security issues.

### Village website

The PC has approved budget for a significant refresh of the village website; we are involving the Village Association and the Tyrell Trust in the project. We would like to include new photos of some of the houses and other landmarks in the village; amateur photographer needed!

## Can you help?

The Parish Council is looking for volunteers in the following areas:

(1) As part of our village Emergency Plan, we're looking for residents to come forward who would be available to help in emergency situations. Lots of different types of help might be needed, from checking up on the vulnerable, maintaining registers, making hot drinks to wielding chainsaws! ## Tackling anti-social behaviour this summer

Historically, we know that the summer months can sadly see an increase in crime and antisocial behaviour. School holidays, warmer weather, big sporting events, often leading to one or two more drinks than normal can all contribute!

So each year Thames Valley Police put in place a plan to deal with these challenges and keep us all safe. July marks the start of a three month operation to crack down on crime and antisocial behaviour, with an emphasis on visible local policing.

This does not just involve the police working in isolation. We will also be working closely with our partners, including councils, schools, health services, business, transport and community organisations.

Policing, in collaboration with partners and local communities, will work to ensure preventative measures are being implemented to better achieve reductions in these crimes and focus on efforts to catch offenders.

Our local policing teams will also be organising days of action and operations to tackle issues such as illegal escooters, street crime, shoplifting, rural crime and other offences that affect communities

Many of these issues often affect our larger towns and cities, but they can have an impact on everyone. Whether it is residents from rural areas visiting their local towns, the impact of rural crime, or simply the fear that anti-social behaviour can create.

The solution to some of these

perennial problems is a strong community. One that does not tolerate disruptive behaviour, one that supports its young people and one where people are willing to take action. That may be as simple as reporting concerns.

If you see something that's not right in your community or witness a crime, please report it quickly so the police have the greatest chance to tackle the problem. In an emergency or if something is happening now, always call 999.

## Recycling consultation

OCC is consulting on changes to household waste recycling arrangements. This consultation closes on August 11th so you need to hurry if you want to make your voice heard.

Your use of our household waste recycling centres (HWRCs)

HWRC availability

Improving reuse and recycling at HWRCs, including sale of second-hand/used items received at HWRCs

Bringing waste to the HWRCs

The van and trailer permit scheme policy

Changes have already been

introduced which require you to go online to book a time to visit the Recycling centre at Drayton. Small amounts of nonhousehold (DIY) waste are accepted free of charge (your free allowance). You must book a visit to use your free allowance. According to the website, if you have not booked you may be charged even for items where disposal is free.
